

JOG GORUNG-Crew 073, Safety 025, Security Guard, on night shift. Was at MIA gangway, at the shell door, at the time of the event. He heard a hissing sound, turned to his right, saw smoke, covered his face with his hands, felt his body get hot. He then turned to the opening in the shell door where crew gangway was and he was physically pushed out. He noticed, while ashore, crew disembarking via the forward gangway, and he saw the crewmember in the water.

The smoke cleared up within 30 seconds. It took about an hour before medical help arrived on-scene. In that time he was evacuating crewmembers who had disembarked the ship via the stores gangway.

When the ambulance arrived he was put on O2, IV administered and he was taken to the hospital. He was in the hospital, Mercy Hospital, for 3 to 4 hours, and released. He was treated for what team believes to be 2<sup>nd</sup> degree burns on elbows, ears, and neck.

He was driven back to the ship, by NCL and returned to duty. A MIA PD officer interviewed him in the hospital.

He was asked for his belt, and medical records, and gave permission for both.
