



## Purpose

To describe the requirements of various flags and port states for reporting of incidents.


## Scope

This applies to all vessels that are certified under Teekay Shipping Limited's Document of Compliance.

## Background

In addition to the usual Teekay incident reporting requirements, certain Flags and Port states require specific incidents that occur either on their vessel or within their territorial waters to be reported within a certain time period - failure to report can result in the vessel being heavily fined. The following list should be considered a guide, however the additional reporting requirements for an incident within any territorial waters not shown below should be considered and discussed with the Ship Team as required.

### Australia (Flag and territorial waters).



**Note:** The above notification is in addition to the First Alert – Incident Notification for Personnel / Ship / Environment Procedure (SP0268).


### Bahamas Flag

**United States (Flag and Territorial Waters)**

Ship / Ship Team to submit to the US Coast Guard Officer in Charge Marine Inspection over the location where the serious marine incident occurred the following:


- 1) Department of Homeland Security: US Coast Guard Report of Marine Accident, Injury or Death (RF0176).
- 2) Department of Homeland Security: US Coast Guard Report of Required Chemical Drug and Alcohol Testing Following a serious Marine Incident (RF0275).

Chemical Testing Following Serious Marine Incidents CFR 46 part 4, subpart 4.06 advises that:

- o Mariners and employees involved in a serious marine incident must be tested for alcohol use within 2 hours of the occurrence of the incident
- o Applies to foreign flagged vessels that are within the 12 nautical mile territorial waters limit of the United States.
- o Requires that the vessels carry alcohol testing devices on board, and authorizes the use of saliva as an acceptable specimen for testing.
- o There is a 32 hour time limit for the collection of specimens for drug testing following a serious marine incident.

- Must complete RF0275 (Form CG-2692B Report of Required Chemical Drug and Alcohol Testing Following a Serious Marine Incident) and append it to RF0176 (CG-2692) when submitted.
