**ORDER GRANTING STAY**

Respondent has requested a stay of NTSB Order No. EA-5415, served October 31, 2008 (reconsideration denied by NTSB Order No. EA-5429, served January 27, 2009), pending disposition of a petition for review of that order in the United States Court of Appeals pursuant to Section 1006 of the Federal Aviation Act (49 U.S.C. § 14110) and the Board's Rules of Practice (49 C.F.R. § 821.64).<sup>1</sup> The Administrator does not oppose respondent's request. It appears that good cause exists for granting the stay.

**ACCORDINGLY, IT IS ORDERED THAT:**

<sup>1</sup> NTSB Order No. EA-5415 concluded that respondent had violated certain provisions of the Federal Aviation Regulations and ordered suspension of respondent's commercial pilot certificate for a 30-day period.

The effective date of NTSB Order No. EA-5415 is stayed until the expiration of the 60-day period within which a petition for review may be filed with the Court of Appeals; however, if such a petition is filed, the stay will continue in effect until the court enters judgment on the petition.
