Capt. Ben Berman

Capt. Ben Berman has been involved with OpenAir since its startup in 2005 and was its founding

Director of Operations. He recently retired as a Captain at United Airlines, with 20 years operating the Boeing 737 and 777 in worldwide service. While flying the line, he also spent several years researching aviation human factors at NASA's Flight Cognition Laboratory. Earlier, Berman was an accident investigator at the National Transportation Safety Board, completing his career there as Chief of the Major Investigations Division.

He is co-author of *The Limits of Expertise: Rethinking Pilot Error and the Causes of Airline Accidents*. Currently, in addition to his work at Open Air, he is analyzing safety data at The LOSA Collaborative and staying flight-qualified as a jet charter pilot and check airman.



William ("Bill") Bramble, Ph.D. National Resource Specialist, Human Performance and Survival Factors Division, Office of Aviation Safety National Transportation Safety Board

Bill Bramble has participated in more than 50 major aircraft accident investigations in the United States and abroad with the NTSB, and has assisted with the development of numerous accident reports and safety recommendations.

He earned a Ph.D. in human factors at the University of Central Florida in 1999 and is a licensed private pilot. Bramble is the outgoing chair of the Human Factors Working Group for the International Society of Air Safety Investigators.



Capt. Paul Hadfield Director of Safety Aero-Tech Services, Inc.

Capt. Paul Hadfield, a PC12 captain, began his aviation career in his mid- to late-30s when he left

his 12-year public school teaching position as an Industrial Arts teacher in Southeast Pennsylvania. His family moved to Spokane, Washington, where he enrolled in school and obtained his A&P license and commercial SEL certificates. After training, Hadfield spent 10 years serving as a missionary and part-time Part 135 pilot in Alaska, where he flew different airframes all over the state. He also used his A&P license extensively and added Inspection Authorization.

Upon his return to Pennsylvania, he worked as an airworthiness inspector for a Cirrus Service Center before obtaining his current position with Aero-Tech Services, Inc. His ratings are as follows: ATP, CFI, CFII, MEI, A&P, with IA.

Eric Hamp's aviation career began after he joined the US infantry and graduated Army flight school

in 2003. He flew the CH-47 Chinook, completing two combat tours—one in Iraq and one in Afghanistan. He joined Blue Hawaiian Helicopters in 2010 to fly tours in Hawaii. After becoming Blue Hawaiian's Director of Safety in 2015, he helped to guide the company to an accepted SMS under the FAA's voluntary program. Born in Southern California, he attended high school and college in Northeast Pennsylvania.



Maria Kelly Vice President of Safety, DER Jet Access Aviation

Maria Kelly is an accomplished aviation safety professional with a background in Part 91, 135, and

121 Cargo Flight Operations. In her role at Jet Access, she leads the company's Safety Management System (SMS) activities, including internal and external evaluation programs, FAA-accepted programs such as ASAP/MSAP (Aviation Safety Action Program/Maintenance Safety Action Program), Emergency Response Planning, EH&S (Environmental Health and Safety), and OSHA compliance.

She helped Jet Access achieve SMS Part 5 active conformance status from the FAA and has served as a presenter at the Aviation Safety Infoshare conferences, as a facilitator at the first Business Aviation Safety Roundtable event, and moderator on SMS at the BASS (Business Aviation Safety Summit).

She holds a bachelor's degree from Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University and has completed further education courses at Cranfield University in England, as well as training in accident investigation at the NTSB Training Center in Ashburn, Virginia.

Rick Kenin assumed his current position in July 2014 following a distinguished career in the US

Coast Guard. As COO, he is responsible for the management oversight of the largest and only independent Part 135 helicopter air ambulance and ground critical care ambulance provider in New England, transporting nearly 5,000 critically ill patients throughout the region each year. During his career as a Coast Guard officer, he served as a fixed and rotary-wing aviator accumulating over 5,000 combined flight hours and commanding two Coast Guard Air Stations, including Coast Guard Air Station Miami, Florida, dubbed "The Busiest Air-Sea Rescue Unit in the World."

He holds degrees from the US Coast Guard Academy, Harvard University, and the National Defense University. He serves on the Board of the Helicopter Association International, Aero Club of New England, and New England Helicopter Council. He is an avid general aviation pilot with nearly two dozen different aircraft models in his logbook.
