Mighty Fine

Associate Executive Director American Public Health Association

Mighty Fine is the interim Associate Executive Director at the American Public Health Association (APHA). His portfolio focuses on

enhancing health science, policy, public health practice and public health leadership. He designs, develops, and evaluates public health programs and provides programmatic technical assistance, consultation and research translation support to local, state and national partners. His efforts aim to not only prevent disease and infirmity but to also bolster opportunities for growth, development and selfactualization, at the individual and community level. Trained as a Social Epidemiologist, his work has stemmed across various aspects of public health, including injury and violence prevention, maternal and family health, HIV/AIDS, HCV, social policy and chronic disease prevention.

Having lived and worked in rural and urban environments, Mighty credits this empirical insight with anchoring his understanding of systematic levers of oppression. Thus, a core part of his work has focused on addressing the structures that serve as pillars of disadvantage. He has built expertise in the social determinants of health and brings a social justice perspective to the assessment and prevention of public health issues. Mighty earned a Bachelor of Science in Public Health from Rutgers University and a Master of Public Health from Yale University, with a concentration in Social and Behavioral Sciences and Chronic Disease Epidemiology. He is also certified by the National Commission for Health Education as a Certified Health Education Specialist (CHES).

Dave Ederer is an Epidemiologist in the Physical Activity and Health Branch at the Centers for Disease

Control and Prevention. His research focuses on applying public health principles in transportation practice, and how the built environment influences chronic disease.

Prior to his current role, He served as a technical advisor to the US Mission to the United Nations and the United Nations Road Safety Collaboration and as an Epidemic Intelligence Service Officer at CDC.

He has a Ph.D. in Transportation Systems Engineering from the Georgia Institute of Technology, and an M.P.H. from the University of Michigan.

Research Foundation Tho "Bella" Dinh-Zarr, PhD, MPH, was the Vice Chairman, Acting Chairman, and 42nd Member of the U.S. National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB).

She currently serves as Senior Advisor for Public Health & Transportation to the FIA Foundation and the Traffic Injury Research Foundation (TIRF), where she works closely with the Blackfeet Nation and the East End District in Houston, Texas. Dr. Dinh-Zarr has held positions at USDOT, CDC, AAA, and TTI.

She has been Co-Chair of the UN NGO Committee for Sustainable Development and is Co-Founder of the 05 Saves Lives Coalition to prevent drinking and driving through .05%BAC laws. Dr. Dinh-Zarr created the "Five I Framework" for prevention-focused crash investigations as part of the Safe System Approach and is committed to advancing transportation that is safe, clean, and ethical for everyone. She speaks English, Spanish, and Vietnamese.



Kathleen Carlson

Professor of Epidemiology OHSU-PSU School of Public Health; Core Investigator at Portland VA

Kathleen Carlson, MS, PhD is an injury epidemiologist and professor of public health at

the Oregon Health and Science University-Portland State University School of Public Health and a core investigator with the VA Portland Health Care System.

Dr. Carlson's research examines the spectrum of injury and violence prevention, from the epidemiology of intentional and unintentional injuries to the rehabilitation of military veterans with combat injuries and comorbid mental health disorders. Her current research grants examine gun violence and other firearm-related injuries, opioid-related injuries, and the short- and long-term functional outcomes of veterans' traumatic brain injury.

Dr. Carlson teaches and mentors MPH and PhD students in epidemiology, research methods, and health services research. She serves on the board of directors for the Society for Advancement of Violence and Injury Research and as Chair-elect of the APHA Injury Control and Emergency Health Services section.

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
